# Survey results


1. Population surveyed: 215 respondents, 52% women, 42% men, age (25-34 years 13%, 35-44 30%, 45-54 33%, 55-64 21%, >64 3%)










### 3. Reported situations and needs

Examples of reported situations:

"We set up a cantonal One Health organisation. The common themes have been defined. The challenge now is to implement the defined fields of action appropriately."

"I am a veterinarian and would like to treat a group of fattening calves with antibiotics. What impact does this have on the manure and bacteria in the environment?"

"I lead a working group focusing on One Health and regularly see the struggles of different languages being spoken in the respective fields as well as the limited knowledge from other dimensions which are not an individual expertise" > The core topics of a One Health training can be defined based on reported situations and issues encountered by professionals when they aim to work in a One Health approach.
